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

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

PRESIDENT'S PAGE



Thank You For the Honor And Privilege

n September 24, at Highty-Tighty Homecoming, I'll be passing the HTA Guidon to Chuck Rowell as I step down after serving

nine years as HTA president. In this, my last President's Page in the "Highty-Tighty Notes," I offer my sincere thanks to all Highty-Tighty alumni for giving me the honor and privilege to serve as your president. It has meant more than you can know to be able to give back in this way to the organization that has had the greatest impact on my life since the day I graduated.

It was in the fall of 1950 that I first marched with the Highty-Tighties. As a small boy just short of my fifth birthday, I ran out onto the Drillfield and marched alongside the Band, just behind Jim Schaeffer, as they led the Corps of Cadets past the reviewing stand to end a review. I met Jim Schaeffer that day, and I got to know him over the following year until his passing in November 1951. Later I was given his trumpet, and I played it from fourth grade through high school. From that day I ran out onto the Drillfield and marched alongside the Band, it was always my dream to become a member of the Highty-Tighties. That dream came true when I returned with Jim Schaeffer's trumpet as a member of the Highty-Tighty Class of 1968. A year after graduation, I presented the trumpet to the Band for display in the Cadet Museum. When we creat-



ed the Highty-Tighty Alumni Band, I returned to play it at homecoming each year to keep Major Jim's spirit alive with us.

So my connection to the Highty-Tighties goes all the way back to when I was only four years old. It will continue as long as I live, and to be honored to serve as president of the HTA and help support the Regimental Band has been the best part of the story.

We have worked together over the last nine years to accomplish a lot of good things. When I became president, I told Charlie Cornelison that I would do everything possible to realize the vision he had put forth as president in the early 1980s-to return the Band to the size it was in the 1950s and early 1960s, marching a 144-man block. At homecoming 2008, my first as president, the Highty-Tighties marched approximately 85 cadets at pregame. It took until year before last for the Band to reach the size Charlie had envisioned more than thirty-five years ago, but the vision was realized when the Highty-Tighties marched into Lane Stadium in a 12 by 12 block in 2014. This success was due to the efforts of many people, and while we alumni cannot take full credit for making it happen, it would certainly not have happened without our efforts. We can be very proud of the part we have played in restoring the Highty-Tighties to the size they are today.

There have been other ways in which the alumni have contributed to the success of the Regimental Band and our own organization. For example, I think the creation of the Highty-Tighty Alumni Pin was important. It allows us all to continue to wear the white cord in a literal sense, and it also is given to each graduating senior to welcome them into the ranks of the alumni. This helps them feel that they are part of the alumni from the day they graduate. We created the award of Distinguished Highty-Tighty Alumni, to recognize those alumni who have made exceptional and dedicated life-long contributions to the alumni organization and to the Band. We started a mentor program in which alumni mentor Highty-Tighty freshmen and help them meet the challenges of their freshman year. This program has been as beneficial and rewarding to the alumni as it has been to the cadets. It is such a privilege and a pleasure to get to know these young cadets and help them as they join the Highty-Tighty family. This is but one way we have also formed a closer bond to all of the cadets. We now work much more closely with them than ever before. They now better understand what the alumni do, and we have a much more effective relationship that is beneficial in providing them with the support they deserve and need.

As I step down as president, we are also beginning a

new initiative that is so important to the Highty-Tighties. This support is in the form of providing new and quality used instruments to the Band. Information is provided elsewhere in this newsletter that explains how you can help in this important initiative. Please participate in this program if you possibly can.

There are so many wonderful people with whom I have many generations to come. worked over the past nine years as president who I want to thank. Grateful appreciation goes to General Randal Fullhart, Colonel Patience Larkin and her administrative assistants, Colonel Rock Roszak, Colonel David Spracher, LTC Chuck Pavne, MUSC Jim Bean, LTC George McNeill, LTC Gary Jackson, LTC Rewa Mariger, and Leketa Miller have all been great to work with. I also thank all of the alumni, and especially those who have served on the HTA board of directors during my time as president. It has been a privilege to work with all of you. One of the best benefits of being president has been the opportunity to meet so many alumni from classes dating back to the 1940s. It has been an amazing experience to get to know so many of you and hear your stories of what it was like to be in the Band during the different eras. There are many differences, but the core of what being a Highty-Tighty was and is all about remains the same throughout.

I must also thank my wife, Lynda, whom I first met just as my freshman year in the Highty-Tighties was coming to an end. Lynda knows how much the Highty-Tighties mean to me, and she has supported me throughout my nine years as president, although I know at times she wished I was spending more time with her than taking care of my duties and obligations as president. I could not have done the job without her loving support and understanding.

Finally, and at the top of my list of people to thank, I thank Charlie Cornelison. For eight years he was always there for input and advice. His support was always positive and amazing. He was both a cheerleader and a mentor. He was as fine a president emeritus as he was our president for twenty-seven years. It is tragic that we lost him a year ago. He was the living icon that represented what we were all about. He remains an inspiration even though he is no longer with us.

Although I will be stepping down as president, I will remain as active as I can within the HTA organization and on campus. I plan to keep in touch with the cadet leadership, and I want to keep researching and reporting on the true history of the Regimental Band. I will continue to do the "Half-Notes," so you will still be hearing from me.

Please give Chuck Rowell your strongest support as our new president. I wish Chuck the very best, and I will try to assist him as Charlie did for me. Please remember that we all wear the white cord. We are all Highty-Tighties. I ask all alumni to do everything you can to support this incredible organization and see that it is available for new classes of cadets for many generations to come.

It is time to reflect on my first year as the Highty-Tighty director

s the school year has come to a close, it is time to reflect on my first year as the Highty-Tighty director. What a whirlwind adventure it has been! I am very thankful that my inaugural year had such strong cadet leadership at the helm. The band COs, Carella and Engelmann, consistently demonstrated a high level of commitment and excellence, always willing to answer any question I had with patience and forthright honesty. My first drum major, Dixon Johnson, proved to be an outstanding leader and has set the bar, in my eyes, for what a DM should be. The entire senior HT class will always be remembered as a fantastic group of men and women who welcomed me, this outsider, and made me feel at home.

While participating in the Caldwell March this spring, I overheard an upperclassman ask various freshmen what their highlight was during their first year. The overwhelming response was the friendships they forged within the band and the camaraderie they shared with fellow HTs. This will be what I emphasize when recruiting new bandsmen this summer during orientation in July. I believe young men and women first entering college are looking for a place to belong, and incoming freshmen with musical experience need to know the Highty-Tighties offer that and so much more. Currently, we have over 100 returning upperclassmen and 30-plus incoming freshmen already signed up for band. My goal is to employ 60 new arrivals with an interest in making music by the end of orientation.

So what do I have planned for the coming year? Currently, I am working on the application process for the 2017 Cherry Blossom Festival with the hopes to combine that with a clinic or performance with one of the elite service bands in Washington, DC. Additionally, with a presidential election in January, there is always the possibility of an Inaugural Parade invitation. After a successful May concert, I am optimistic in taking our recording and creating CDs for purchase. These sales, combined with the new instrument initiative (see details on opposite page), will help to replace some of our more "tired" instruments. To date, I am excited to report that we have had several new instruments donated to us: two trombones, a clarinet, and two saxophones. I am extremely excited to begin a second year without the angst of the unknown at every turn! Though



the fall schedule should prove challenging with four football games in September, I have every confidence in the new band leadership chosen for next year. Musically speaking, the elected performance staff is first-rate and our new DM, Kavi Muraleetharan, is an exceptional musician. Our administrative staff, with Band CO Nate Oslund in charge, exhibits the strength of character and dedication required of this deed-based organization. I look forward to the new year and can't wait to see what these talented, future leaders can accomplish!



HIGHTY-TIGHTY INSTRUMENT INITIATIVE

Utfitting a 150-plus musical organization with instruments is both costly and continuous. As instruments get tired and old, replacement becomes necessary. Due to age and years of outdoor performances, as well as an influx in performers, the band is in need of many new instruments. In order to alleviate some of the cost, the *HT Instrument Initiative* is being introduced to help supplement our supply. Alumni interested in helping can participate in two ways.

First, one can purchase a new instrument from our needs list, which is continually being updated as donations are received. These include piccolos, saxophones, trumpets, marching baritones, and sousaphones. It is important to note that only instruments from the list may be sponsored. If you choose to purchase an instrument from our list, your name will be engraved on that instrument as a testament to your donation.

Secondly, if you own a musical instrument that is collecting dust, you can donate a gently used band instrument. In order to be cost effective, only instruments in good repair can be accepted. For example, brass instruments should be free of noticeable dents, and woodwind instruments should have workable pads. Additionally, trumpets and trombones must be silver-plated. Your contribution of an instrument can be claimed as a tax deduction.
