A Bigger Band and a New Coaching Staff!

Recruiting of the upcoming Freshman Class of 2026 is going well. July 5, 2022 saw the Corps of Cadets reinstate the Corps orientation for our incoming Cadets. It had not occurred the previous two summers because of Covid restrictions.

We helped the recruiting effort by paying for four Highty-Tighties to be part of the orientation staff each day to enlighten and influence musicians entering the Corps to join the Band and receive our NEW 2 year signing bonus (formerly called a Freshman Stipend).

We currently have 68 incoming freshmen signed. Our largest incoming freshman class in over 10 years has Sr. Chief Jim Bean and his Cadet leaders quite excited.

This year's Highty-Tighty Homecoming will be similar to last year 2021. Our football team's opponent on October 15th is the University of Miami.

The parade will again be at 7pm on Friday evening October 14th. We plan to have a shorter parade this year and encourage each of you to join us at the beginning of the parade (or for our older or challenged alumni please join in as we begin down Alumni Mall in front of the Upper Quad).

We will again practice on Saturday morning on the drill field with the current Highty-Tighties for the pre-game show. Depending on the announced game time, we hope to proceed to the 2nd floor of Dietrick Hall for our luncheon after practice. You should by now be able to register for the parade, practice, luncheon and pregame show.

On May 6 we had a good turnout for our first ever VTCC golf outing in Riner, Va. at the Auburn Hills Golf Club. The Highty-Tighty Annual Giving Fund was the recipient of the funds raised. We had many prize-winners and we had guests for Raleigh, Charlottesville, and the surrounding area. Thank you to all that participated.

This fall semester the Band will be housed back on the Upper Quad together in the Pearson Hall facilities. We expect

to have about 130 members in the Band this year. We had an excellent Senior class graduate in May. Their leadership and energy led our band members to an outstanding year. Read President Emeritus Bert Kinzey's article to see just how good their year ended.

In August we will begin the same monthly recruiting meetings that we began last year. With that continued emphasis on time, contacts, expense, emailing, texting, and summer orientation we will now hope for 60+ incoming freshman Highty-Tighties each successive year.

Unprecedented Number of New Recruits

It's hard to believe that we are getting ready for fall semester and the return of this years' chosen cadre. Since we have had an un-

precedented number of new recruits, the fall cadre will be extremely busy in their efforts to train and indoctrinate our new band freshmen. At the time of this writing, we had over 60 prospective Highty-Tighties signed up for band. This can be attributed to our spring recruiting drive led by Cadet Banning Jones who not only narrated but wrote and directed the successful HT recruiting video. Additionally, he

led a letter writing/phone call campaign with his staff, resulting in these much needed numbers. The staff, specifically hired for HT recruiting during summer orientation, was led by C/ Hunter Lambert and provided remarkable efforts from fellow HT's, Morgan Hendrickson, Nathan Guevera, and Jake Scott. Their outstanding contributions combined with alumni support from Gary Jackson, Dave Williams, and Chuck Rowell resulted in one of, if not the strongest, entering classes. While the instrumentation is far from perfect, we were able to secure many much needed trombones and trumpets.

We can all be proud of our Highty-Tighties and their work from the spring semester. The band walked away with many awards including a Virginia Tech community of the year award from residential

Other recognition includes: 2nd place in the Platoon Tactical Challenge, 3rd place in company athletics, and individual awards to Band CO Brett Nutter (Lacy O. Brumback Award for Commander of the Year) and Fall section commander Olivia Asuncion (Caitlin M. Hammaren Award, Distinguished Service to a Residential Community). Other highlights from this spring included our participation in the Governor of Virginia Inauguration parade in January and the Mardi Gras parade in New Orleans. Both parades were well attended and we were given much exposure to both spectators and television viewing audiences.

This fall should be a very exciting time for the Highty-Tighties. With the arrival of our freshmen class, we will reach members in the band that will equal or exceed our pre-Covid numbers. Additionally, our new commander, Will Albertson should prove to be an exceptional leader and has some great ideas for the band this year. would like to provide you with a few positive updates since the Spring edition..

First, there were 2 new Highty Tighty specific ELS Scholarships created in FY22 that will be able to financially support cadets this upcoming year. Also, there are now over 20 HT Specific Scholarships in the Corps, and Highty Tighty specific Endowment values increased for FY22 by an average of about \$4,000-\$6,000.

The Schaeffer Endowment Fund continues to need funds in order to maintain the \$1,000 stipend that each incoming band freshmen and sophomores receive. This fund is attractive to prospective band members, so there is always a need to maintain this great asset.

The Highty-Tighty Annual Giving Fund (Fund # 877055) is growing and doing very well and has grown by over \$100,000 in the last year. This fairly new fund has allowed for the band to have additional money available should there arise a specific need that is not endowment related. The Brick Program is still ongoing, and this is the perfect way to contribute to the Annual Giving Fund. When an individual gives to an operating fund in the amount of \$2,500 (that is not part of an endowment), they get to have their name on a brick style plaque that will go into the new Corps Leadership and Military Science (CLMS) building. This donation can be given all at once, or broken up over a five year period. Please contact Sandi Bliss if you are interested in

taking part in this, and having your name in the CLMS just like you signed your name in the bricks on Lane Hall when you graduated.

With our support these current and future band members can continue to strive and understand what it means to be a Highty-Tighty. If you are interested in providing financial support, please contact Sandi Bliss (at srbliss@vt.edu). It truly does make a difference!

Note from President Emeritus

Reasons To Be Proud

he past two years have placed incredible demands on the Highty-Tighties while de-

priving cadets of some of the great and rewarding experiences that are a normal part of the experience of being a member of the regimental band in other years. During the fall semester of 2020, the Highty-Tighties did not even enter Lane Stadium, much less preform at a football game. They could not march in their usual formation for much of the time, and they could not play and practice together as they normally would. Many other changes had to be made and activities had to be cancelled and discontinued in order to protect cadets and staff from COVID.

Living in Blacksburg and watching the Highty-Tighties over the past two years has provided me with some perspective as to what all of the cadets have had to deal with and overcome as they faced the additional challenges brought on by the pandemic. But even my proximity and interaction with the Highty-Tighty cadets most assuredly did not reveal all they were dealing with. However, I can tell you that the leadership of the band over these past two school years has been outstanding, and the spirit of all of the cadets remains generally strong. Certainly, the pandemic has taken its toll with higher-than-normal attrition for a number of reasons, both directly and indirectly, and there is more to do in getting all aspects of the Highty-Tighty experience back to what it should be with full participation in all activities in which the band is usually involved.

This past school year was a welcome step back toward normalcy, although it was far from complete. The Highty-Tighties did return to Lane Stadium for football games, but as they did, neither the sophomore class nor the new freshmen had ever performed before a Virginia Tech football crowd. Many adjustments still had to be made, and the leadership of the band had to meet additional challenges that were beyond what they would have had to face under normal circumstances. Drum Major

Joe Topp and the performance staff did an excellent job in preparing and executing the shows as the band returned to the field.

During the 2021-2022 school year, under the leadership of Band Company commanders, Skyler Powell and Brett Nutter, and with the support of the entire senior class, the Highty-Tighties excelled in all they did, and we alumni have great reason to be very proud of what they accomplished under the difficult circumstances they faced. After returning to the field in the fall and completing a busy football season, they began their support of the women's basketball program. As they returned to campus in January, they looked outstanding in the inaugural parade for Virginia's governor, Glenn Youngkin. But there were other unit and individual awards as well. The Highty-Tighties won the award as the Virginia Tech Community of the Year, being recognized as the outstanding residential community on campus. The Caitlin M. Hammaren Award for Distinguished Service to the residential community went to Cadet Olivia Asuncion. The Highty-Tighties won first place in the VTCC Jaffe Eager Squad competition, and the VTCC

Freshman Eager Individual also went to a Highty-Tighty. The band took second place in the Platoon Tactical Challenge, and they just narrowly missed winning the Beverly S. Parrish Gold Cord Award, coming in as a very close second place.

As we look forward to the new year that will begin soon, the recruiting is looking good with over 58 new freshmen already signed up as this is written. We expect the new freshman class to have well over sixty members by the time New Cadet Week begins. Under the leadership of Band Company Commander, Will Albertson, the band will continue to face challenges, but the new school year promises a continued return to normalcy as the pandemic is put in the past. But we should remember and acknowledge the outstanding dedication and perseverance that the Highty-Tighties displayed both collectively and individually in dealing with very trying and challenging times these past

two school years. They have given us reasons to be proud, and more importantly they maintained the foundation to build on as the Highty-Tighties move forward into the future.

We alumni need to do our part. During the pandemic, our contact with the cadets has been very limited. The alumni mentor program had to be seriously curtailed. But now we have the chance to be more involved and to support the Highty-Tighties financially and in other ways to help them excel and to have the very best possible Highty-Tighty experience.

The photo collage above is just a sample of some of the shots taken members of the Commandant's Staff during this special day on the golf course.



Alumni Recruiting

The Summer of '22 - A Turning Point in Recruiting

since October 2021, a small, dedicated team of Highty-Tighty recruiters consisting of members of the Commandant's staff, the Admission's Office, and your Board of Directors, meeting monthly, has been working to reverse a downward trend in numbers of Highty-Tighty freshmen.

One of the major negative impacts to recruiting for the Band was brought on with the pandemic. The University was forced to pause the traditional summer orientation program. After two years without summer orientation the decision was made to replace it with a 3-day early return to campus for all freshmen for an oncampus introduction.

The lack of summer orientation impacted the Corps of Cadets significantly because the fitting and issue of uniforms is a lengthy and labor-intensive process. I believe that the impact reached further as orientation in years past has made parents our first line of retention. Parents, with their life experience, many times see the long-term value of the Corps and the Band in much sharper focus than their freshman. In July, under MG Fullhart's leadership, the Corps of Cadets initiated its own summer orientation program that has significantly improved the strength of the Highty-Tighties, and I believe will strengthen the entire Corps.

A standout feature of the Corps' summer orientation program was the number of Band Company cadets who worked for the Commandant as ambassadors for the Corps. To augment those cadets the executive committee authorized the hiring of 2 additional current Highty-Tighties to further enhance the workforce for the three weeks that the orientation program has run.

How successful has the program been? In mid-April there were 34 incoming Highty-Tighties, and as of today the last day of the Corps' summer orientation, there are 68 incoming Highty-Tighties. To say the program has been successful would be an understatement. It has been so successful that plans are already un-

derway for the Corps' summer orientation program next year.

Summer orientation was not the only recruiting initiative. Credit also goes to the rank and file of the current Band as they made telephone calls to prospective Highty-Tighties in the spring. Your alumni recruiting team backed this up by sending personal notes to all incoming cadet freshmen that played an instrument. When asked why they chose to join the Highty-Tighties many of this years' incoming freshmen commented on the interest that the Band and its alumni had shown in them.

With the returning upperclassmen the Band will easily exceed 100 musicians, but the real goal and the future is to be found in the Fall of 2025 and beyond. If we can maintain this recruiting initiative in the years to come the assigned strength of the Band should well exceed the numbers to keep the long-sought goal of 144 musicians in ranks for performances. Highty-Tighties we are mighty....

So, what's next? As in the past, each recruiting year stands alone, and recruiting for the fall of 2023 starts immediately. I suggest we start this recruiting year by watching the cadet led vid-"Meet the Highty-Tighties" www.vtcc.vt.edu/band. Just click on the start button and enjoy the enthusiasm of the current Band. I would be remiss if I didn't mention Cadet Banning Jones HT-23, the driving force behind this video that has been viewed roughly 1 million times in the past 12 months – well done and done in the finest tradition of Highty-Tighty excellence!
