Then September 10th brought Corps Reunion beginning with a wonderful evening behind Lane Hall with Cadets manning stations showing all of the different activities that many of them take part in. There was also a formal retreat followed by a nice dinner under a big tent for all Corps alumni attending. On Saturday, the 11th, we had a nice group of Highty-Tighty alumni for the pregame Corps units march on.

The next event was H.T. Homecoming. It began with a Pass in Review on Friday, October 15th afternoon where Rock Roszack reviewed the Corps of 1270 members with General Fullhart. Rock represented the Class of 1971 and gave a speech to recognize the Class of 1971 becoming members of the Corps OLD GUARD. Our Band '71 members present were asked to stand in a place of honor at the reviewing stand as they became the newest members of the OLD GUARD.

Shortly afterwards, the Highty-Tighty Alumni Band, led by Drum Major Lori Keck Beach, marched in the annual VT Homecoming parade which was Friday night this year. Leading the alumni band was our newest Distinguished Highty-Tighty Alumnus George McMichael and his wife Diane in a shiny convertible. At the end of the parade, we started a new tradition of having our alumni band end the parade on the drillfield sidewalk surrounded by the current Highty-Tighties as we played Tech Triumph. Gunnyfest finished off Fridays festivities hosted by board members Dirk McComsey and Scott Beman.

On Saturday morning, we had our pregame rehearsal on the drillfield with the current HTs. We went straight from this rehearsal to Dietrick Hall for our meal and HTA, Inc. Annual meeting. Following the meal we had some time to visit with classmates and other alumni before moving to the South End Zone of Lane

where we performed our traditional pregame show for over 60,000 fans. We had a great turnout for both the Friday night parade and the pregame show on Saturday. We hope that this year we will have the same alumni and many of the Class of 1972 HTs join us.

If you haven't participated in a while, know that older alumni or Highty-Tighty alumni with health issues are now encouraged to join us in front of the Moss Arts Center as we begin marching the final stretch down the Alumni Mall. You don't even need an instrument to participate in this part of the parade. Just join us if you want to feel younger again.

With the Corps well on its way to the expansion towards 1400 members, a group of us have been meeting one day each month to improve the recruiting of new members into the Highty-Tighties. We will continue these meetings all of 2022. Our goal is to have 50 or more new freshmen each year. This group is improving the many avenues of recruiting into the Band with the help of Lt. Col Rewa Mariger and new VTCC Admissions officer Greg Anderson.

Finally, beginning this semester, the recent custom of having the Band divided into two sections, Band A and Band B, will end with the Band being reemerged into ONE Band. This will help retention and many other issues.

Extremely Challenging Fall Semester

Ithough it was exciting to get back to a more typical fall semester, this season was extremely challenging. More than half

the band, all freshmen and sophomores, had never experienced a football season with all the marching practice and music learning involved in a "normal" situation. Additionally, the band, including myself, struggled with bringing the group into the 21st century with a new software program called Pyeware. This program will eventually decrease the time spent on drill by publishing individual counts, syncing se-

lected music, and demonstrating graphics of the drill before the first practice. The goal being to limit the time of learning so more run-throughs can be made for each set, resulting in a polished project. However, like any new platform, there is a steep learning curve. While it took some extra effort and work, our performance staff, led by drum major Joe Topp did a commendable job of implementing the agenda, resulting in our shows getting better and better through the season.

While everyone has felt the impact of the last year and a half, the HT's have suffered with declining numbers and frankly, it will get somewhat worse as our seniors graduate in the spring. In-person orientation is a chance for myself and several HT's to talk to each incoming corps freshmen, offering them

Members of the Class of 1971 pledged \$86,000 during the HT Reunion last fall to the HT Class of 1971 ELS Fund. This will make a big difference in the lives of HT cadets! In addition, we wish to thank a Highty-Tighty Alum who included the band in his estate. This contribution went to the once struggling LTC George R. McNeill Scholarship that is now valued at \$233,316.26.

The Schaeffer Endowment Fund continues to need funds in order to maintain the \$1,000 stipend that each incoming band freshmen and now sophomores receive. The band needs our financial support to be able to continue to grow as we make efforts to bring in young men and women who exemplify what it means to be a Highty-Tighty.

The Highty-Tighty Annual Giving Fund (Fund # 877055) is growing and doing very well, and we want to continue to provide financial support.

There is an ongoing effort that you might consider giving to called the Brick Program. When an individual gives to an operating fund the amount of \$2,500 (that is not part of an endowment), they get to have their name on a brick style plaque that will go into the new Corps Leadership and Military Science (CLMS) building. I think the title "Highty-Tighty" means more

Alumni Recruiting

Start a Conversation

he Highty-Tighties need our help with recruiting. The ongoing pandemic has put a . pretty serious dent in recruiting for the Corps and for the Band. College fairs have gone from large in-person events to virtual conversations with limited time and limited participation – a serious problem. In the current recruiting environment, a high school student would either have to know about the Corps and Band from friends or family members or they would have to have done considerable research starting from the Virginia Tech homepage. Add to that a Virginia Tech calendar full of academic requirements, performance commitments to Virginia Tech athletic teams, numerous Corps requirements, and there might be two weekends left in a year for attending parades on the east coast – prime recruiting territory.

So, as alumni what can we do? We need to start conversations about the Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets and the Highty-Tighties anywhere and anytime we can. Back in the fall I blundered into the opportunity to talk briefly about the Highty-Tighties to the seven high school band directors in Augusta County where I live. My home is next door to one of the high schools and on that particular evening I listened to the high school band rehearsing. The thing was, this was a much bigger band. Turns out it was a county-wide marching band festival that evening. I put on a new Virginia Tech Regimental Band polo shirt (bought at Expertees in Blacksburg, look them up - great Highty-Tighty shirts at reasonable prices), grabbed two small stacks of business cards (Highty-Tighty cards and personal business cards), walked next door and launched into seven separate, brief conversations about the Virginia Tech Regimental Band, cadet Emerging Leader Scholarships, and the Band's \$2000 signing bonus. If an incoming freshman from Virginia wins an ELS and joins the Band the financial aid packet totals \$10,000. A five-figure financial aid number is a great ice breaker, particularly with In addition to the band directors, I talked individually with several high school musicians and two sets of parents. A couple of days

later Senior Chief Bean, the Highty-Tighty director, followed up with emails to the high school band directors I had spoken with. Will this have a big impact on the fall of 2022 – probably not, but you can never tell when conversations will pay off. I intend to follow up with one of the families that I spoke with because the student's grandparents attend my church.

You don't have to search out big events; large numbers of alumni having one-on-one conversations can change the recruiting picture significantly. Not too long ago I struck up a conversation with a parent and their high school aged child in the grocery store. The student was wearing a high school band jacket. Neither the parent nor their teenager had heard of the Highty-Tighties. I gave a quick overview of the band, reached in my wallet and handed the family one of the "Highty-Tighty business cards" I always have.

Bottom line, let's go start some conversations.
